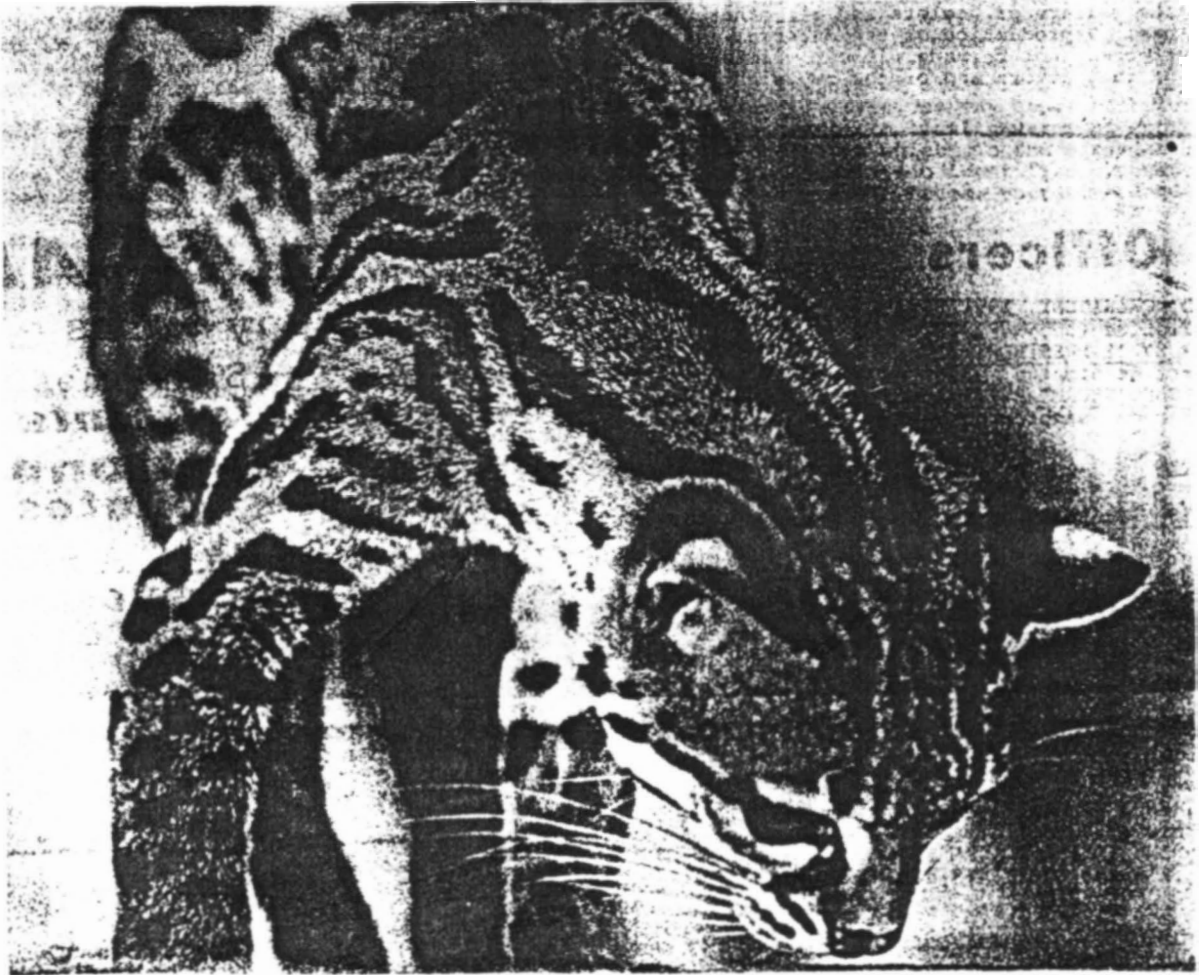

ACTION NEEDED IN CALIFORNIA NOW!

Introduced by Assemblyman Mello

March 13, 1978

AB 2840

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

REFERRED TO COMMITTEE ON WATER, PARKS, AND WILDLIFE

An act to add Section 3005.9 to the Fish and Game Code, relating to mammals.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 2840, as introduced, Mello (W., P., & W.). Cats: capture, possession, or confinement.

Under existing law it is generally unlawful to capture, possess or confine any live game mammal, game bird, or non-game bird taken from the wild, except as provided by the Fish and Game Code or regulations made pursuant thereto.

This bill would make it unlawful to capture, possess, or confine any live cat (familia felidae), except house cats (Felis domesticus), and would require any such cat to be seized by the Department of Fish and Game.

The bill would authorize the Fish and Game Commission to promulgate regulations permitting the temporary confinement of cats, other than house cats for specified purposes and, would exempt from its provisions zoos and public display, or veterinary or other scientific institutions as determined by the commission.

The bill would become operative January 1, 1980.

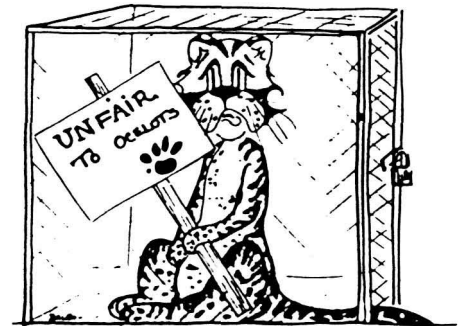
The Bill would specify that there shall be no reimbursement for any state-mandated local program for a specified reason.

Vote: majority. Appropriation: no. Fiscal Committee: yes. State-mandated local program: yes.

1 SECTION 1. Section 3005.9 is added to the Fish
2 and Game Code, to read:
3 3005.9 It is unlawful to capture, possess or
4 confine any live cat (familia felidae), except
5 house cats (Felis domesticus). Any cat possessed
6 or confined in violation of this section shall be
7 seized by the department.
8 The commission may promulgate regulations permit-
9 ing the temporary confinement of cats, other than
10 house cats, for the purpose of treating them, if
11 injured or diseased, or for utilization in the pro-
12 duction of commercial motion pictures.
13 This section does not apply to zoos open for
14 public display, or veterinary or other scientific
15 institutions as determined by the commission.
16 SECTION 2 Notwithstanding Section 2231 of the
17 Revenue and Taxation Code, there shall be no reim-
18 bursement pursuant to that section nor shall there
19 be any appropriation made by this act because the
20 Legislature recognizes that during any legislative
21 session a variety of changes to laws relating to
22 crimes and infractions may cause both increased and
23 decreased costs to local government entities and
24 school districts which, in the aggregate, do not
25 result in significant identifiable cost changes.
26 This section shall become operative January 1, 1980

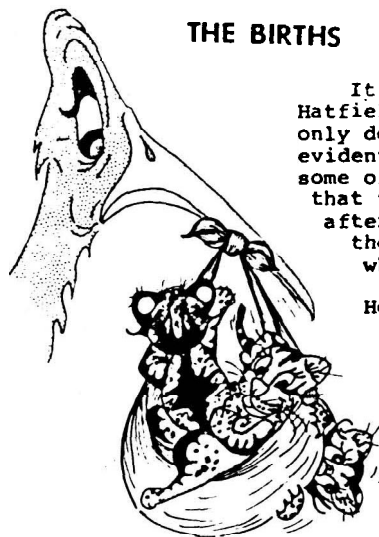
These contributions were from as much as \$200 on down to \$2, and believe me they were all sincerely appreciated. The above people are club members: Bernice Ricketts, Jack Hanna, Jerry Nash, Sara Yonz and Marge Greene were friends of Bill's in Orlando and they also helped.

Note that I didn't say feline family, because I had a varied group. Anything that needed a home was never refused: Pokey bear, Tally lioness, Luta wolf, the ocelots, leopard cats, bobcats, bengal cats, ferrets, caracal, pumas, etc., etc. even a dog he took in to keep it from being destroyed. All in all, he had some 60-70 animals

with their varying needs, diets, and problems to say nothing of caging. At the time of his death, he was living on property with Charles & Sadie Douglas; as they are about 250 miles from us and as we are not in a position to financially contribute, Charles & Sadie have had the whole burden of feeding and housing this sudden acquisition. A further complication was that no will was ever found. For heaven's sake! if you don't have one, get one! Everyone "knew" that Bill had a will and knew he would provide for his animals until they too live out their lives - but nothing to this effect including instructions, insurance or cash was ever found. The money he did have in the bank of course went to his heirs. And to further complicate matters, the heirs wanted the animals sold and the proceeds added to the estate. It took many visits to the lawyers before things were finally settled and Charles was able to get full ownership. (Think about this: when you die if you have no will, who would be your heirs? What would their feelings be about your cats? would your ocelot or cougar be looked upon as salable assets?)

Then, if all that wasn't enough, the State of Florida was pressing to get the cages re-done to conform to Florida standards. (Many of the cages were temporary traveling cages that were still in use.) The state officials were very understanding when Ken contacted them, but they merely postponed the deadline for a few months; the cages still had to be rebuilt.

Today, Charles is still building and/or reconstructing cages. All but one of the animals Bill left in his care are still alive. (Old Versingentrix, a seventeen old cougar died of kidney failure a few weeks ago). Tally lioness got very sick shortly after Bill's death, but the Douglasses managed to pull her through. Pokey bear grumbles at everyone; he was Bill's boy and no one will ever change that. But the main desire of Charles & Ken - to keep the animals together as a group, as Bill did, and as they know he would have wanted has so far been accomplished. If you have a spare dollar or two, caging is still needed and it would help greatly alleviate Charles' burden - a burden gladly accepted in memory of a true friend of all animals.



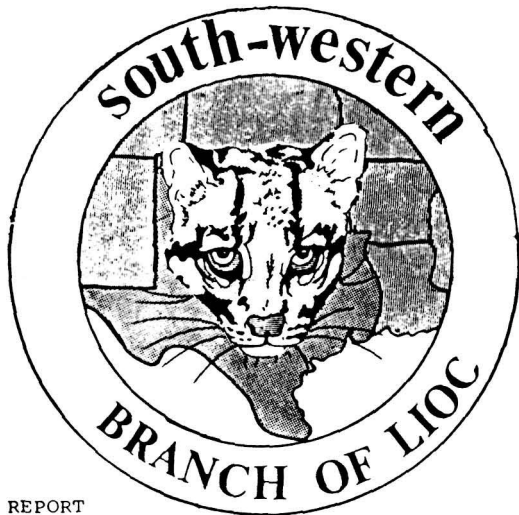
THE BIRTHS

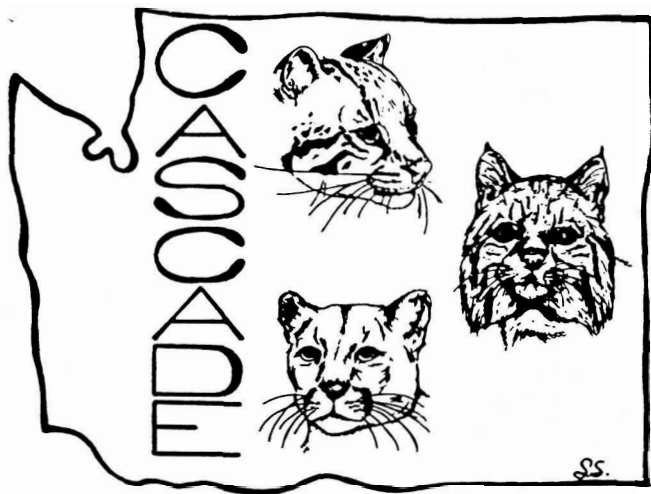
Our new business was for nominations for Officers for 1978. The voting will be by secret ballot by mail. Results will be announced at the Christmas party.

February 26, 1978

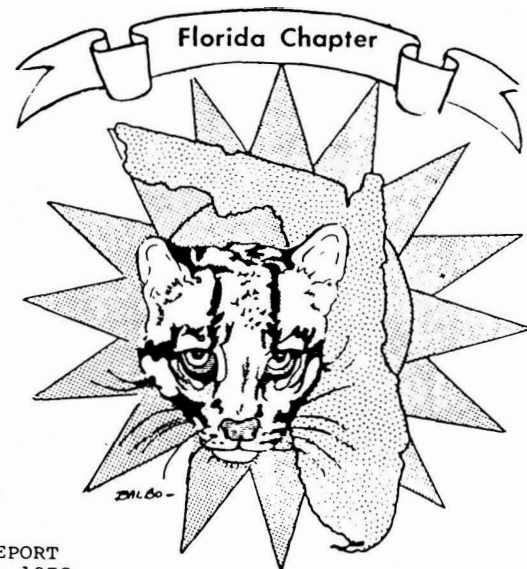

MEETING REPORT
January 8, 1978

A rainy Florida afternoon drove LIOC'ers inside for their bi-monthly meeting at the home of Carol and Art VanVlack in Altamonte Springs. Members and their guests kept dashing outside to see the "cage on wheels" of Richard and Marion Gardner which is of sturdy construction, with shelves, potty boxes, rubber tires and is 8'x8'x16'. It houses a pair of pumas, Candy & Charley, both over a year old. Inside the Gardner's truck was a bit of a black cat in the shape of Checkers, a seven month old male leopard born at Baudy's Rare Feline Breeding Compound last summer. He was very friendly to everyone, and BeeJay Lester was especially delighted to renew acquaintance with the little one which she had been raising on the bottle when she worked for Baudy. The Gryniers, Peggy & Roy, and daughter Brenda, amused members with stories of their 18 month old ocelot, Paca. Everyone enjoyed seeing the VanVlacks houseful of assorted cats - from their domestic Manx mother and her kits to the "bobcats in the bedroom" to their little lady jaguar outside and the two neutered male ocelots who kept trying to catch a domestic kitten as it played alongside their cage. BeeJay Lester passed around pictures of her 8½ year old male margay Gigolo, who has been having hair thinning problems. It was suggested by Ken Hatifield that the use of enzymes in his diet might help. Vets had diagnosed the problem as flea allergy and recommended steroids, but the cat doesn't have a flea problem and the steroids, flea powders and bathings have not helped much.

Vice President, Ken Hatifield, was the only officer in attendance and he presided over our casual meeting. We all missed Chapter Secretary Jean Hatfield, who stayed home to tend to the felines. Jean has been Chapter Secretary since its inception over 15 years ago and has done a dedicated and good job for us. LIOC members present gave her three cheers in absenteesim for all that she has done for our Chapter. Attendance at meetings has been decreasing due to various economic problems, legislative restrictions, and other personal commitments by members. It was discussed how we could increase interest and attendance by having guest speakers, meetings held at wildlife attractions, an activity committee, etc. All suggestions are welcome. Also discussed was the Florida law for permits and the high fee. Ken said he had talked to legislators trying to get a bill introduced for fee reduction but so far unsuccessfully because the legislators have not had enough response from their constituents to support the bill. We were told of an ocelot owner (former club member) whose cat escaped during a burglary and then bit someone. The owners were fined by the local judge but was allowed to keep the cat in a newly constructed cage with the appropriate permits. ◀

IT PAYS TO ADVERTISE

As many LIOC members know and have seen, LIOC been running ads in CATS MAGAZINE, CAT FANCY and several other smaller publications for the past few months. The results of these ads have been astonishing to me, and I thought that LIOCers would like to hear about them.

Our ad in CATS Magazine began April 1, 1977. To my delight, requests for information began coming in immediately at an average of about three a day. To date (February 1978) I have received and processed 344 such requests for information on the cats and LIOC.

There have been a number of obvious categories these requests have fit into. Some people say they would not consider owning an exotic, but are merely curious about us. Others say they have "always" wanted one of these cats. Many of these apparently have second thoughts after reading the materials sent them. Still others are more anxious to learn all they can about LIOC, the cats, etc and have joined our ranks.

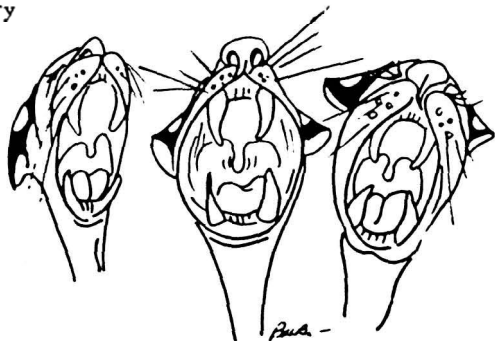
Other types of inquiries have included requests for info for papers being written for schools, groups requesting info on us, and even once a request for advice on requiring an inherited ocelot blanket!

I have never received a letter that was against the Club, our goals, etc., but often enough a letter comes along urging us on and thanking us for our time and talents devoted to these cats.

It is gratifying and uplifting to realize that the "word" about LIOC is getting out in force and that we have public support. Requests for information are continuing to come in daily. I had tried that interest would perhaps drop after a while, but, if anything, it is increasing.

Ken mentioned the rabies rulings in Florida whereby if your animal has had its rabies shot within the last year and it bites someone, the law can allow the owner to quarantine the animal at the owner's home; however, if the cat hasn't had its rabies shot in the past year the law requires that it go to the quarantine station. Ken also told us of a good remedy for all internal parasites (except tapeworms) a product made by Shell oil called "TASK". It can be obtained through a vet but recommended dosage is different than for the domestic cat. We were also reminded that very few Florida members have sent in their ballots for national officers.

One of the members asked about Chippy Cumming a former Jacksonville ocelot and they were told that Chippy and his owners Pet & Jan, had moved to west Florida due to Pete's new job there. A new member to our Chapter, Gladys Lewis, of Lake Panasoffkee who raises felines for Robert Baudy, wanted to attend the meeting but has been quite ill with pneumonia and sent her best wishes anyway. Another new club member, Tracy Johnson, of Sarasota is looking for a baby bobcat to replace hers which died. It was one that had been caught in the wild by someone else and Tracy got it thru a newspaper ad. She was very sad at losing it and hopes to find another one soon.

Since the Florida Chapter's election of officers last summer where Kim Baetjer was elected president and agreed to take office, he has not attended any meeting. 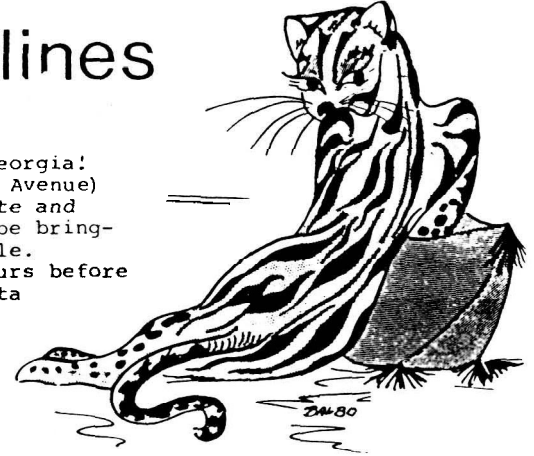

The USDI is considering relieving restrictions on ALL captive born endangered species (not just the self-sustaining populations). This could reclassify captive born as non-endangered. Re: Captive Wildlife Regulation

You may send a copy of the enclosed letter by signing your name and address, or put a letter in your own words, or have copies of this letter made and get everyone you can latch onto to sign (name and address). You should mail them yourself to insure that they are sent. (Note that husband and wife could send separate letters.) If you belong to other Clubs, or have a job where you would be allowed, get copies made at an "Insty Print" or "Sir Speedy" type of place by the hundred, get them signed and mail them in one package. If you, individually, or your branch, need funding for this let me know.

We NEED your letter; we would like to see hundreds, or even thousands, received in Washington.
